

MATCHING GIFT PROGRAM

It has been 17 years since Sandmeyer Steel Company established the Matching Gift Program. The Matching Gift Program provides every employee and retiree with an opportunity to participate in deciding which public charities the Company supports. Approximately 230 organizations that you have contributed to have benefited from the Company's Matching Gift Program, totaling over \$745,000.

- Participant **Eligibility** Both those who are employees of Sandmeyer Steel Company on the date of a gift and persons who have retired directly from the Company are eligible to participate.
- Eligible Recipient **Organizations**

The Internal Revenue Service has specific rules defining tax-exempt public charities. To receive a gift match from the program, an organization must certify that it meets these IRS definitions. Additionally, certain organizations, such as religious, political, and some other organizations, are not eligible.

• Eligible Gifts The minimum employee or retiree contribution to any one organization that will be matched is \$50. Contributions must be in \$50 increments. Gifts must be made by check

or credit card, not


merely pledged.

FABULOUS VACATION

Mauritius is an island known for its beaches, turquoise waters, and mountains. Among the at least two dozen peaks and ridges, LeMorne is a big rock measuring 1,824 feet that projects from the main coast in the extreme southwest. Back in the day, it was an area restricted by an egotistical owner, so the public could not climb it. However, today it is a protected inheritance by UNESCO.

During my school years on Mauritius, my friends and I had two passions: biking and mountain climbing. We climbed all the mountains (the highest being 2,711 feet high), except LeMorne, which was still on our Bucket List.

It was on LeMorne that runaway slaves hid on the summit and in its caves. The story goes that in the days after the liberation of slavery, some slaves who were in hiding saw people approaching who were actually on their way to tell them they were now free. Fearing that they were to be taken back as slaves, they jumped off the cliffs and committed suicide. LeMorne became a UNESCO World Heritage Site as a symbol of this resistance, and that is how two of my friends and I were able to check this last mountain off our Bucket List this summer.

It took Donald, JeanMax, and me two hours to climb to the cross summit and just under two hours to climb down. Of course, we had a dip in the turquoise waters after our efforts. Among the three of us there are a total of 219 years of age.



It's amazing to see dozens of locals and tourists now climbing daily. LeMorne has become as popular as Kilimanjaro in Kenya! Due to its favored position and extreme natural beauty, it is perhaps equally known as one of the island's best beach destinations.
