




# RETIREMENT GALA

# **DREAMS** DO **COME TRUE**

My dad was a civil engineer, and my mom was a nurse. Dad worked during the day and mom at night to ensure that at least one parent would be at home with the kids. Many nights mom would bring us small treats on her way back from the hospital. Kinder Joy chocolate eggs were my favorite as they had a plastic capsule that housed a toy which had to be assembled. What more could a young boy ask for? Candy and a toy in one, a win-win in my book! I didn't have a lot of toys growing up, so I always looked forward to receiving a Kinder Joy egg from mom. One day, the toy I got was a tiny F-16 Fighting Falcon. I was ecstatic, and this is where my fascination — rather obsession — with aviation began.



I grew up in Kuwait, a tiny country that is only 15% the size of Pennsylvania. The only international airport was right in the middle of the city. Therefore, I was accustomed to the sights and sounds of commercial jets flying low over my head. Sometimes the sounds were so loud that household items would rattle and fall off the shelf. As a young boy, I would race out to the streets from our little apartment to catch a glimpse of these magnificent birds in flight. These moments lay the foundation for a lifelong dream to one day be able to pilot these majestic birds through the friendly skies. I created imaginary tales in my head of flying my family on vacations or aiding in a rescue mission or protecting my friends from an enemy aircraft. I signed up for a school field trip to the Airforce Museum and Training Facility. I got the rare opportunity to sit in the cockpit of a Mirage F1 as well as listen to experiences from Air Force pilots. Pumped with knowledge and enthusiasm, I knew what I wanted to become: an Air Force pilot!

I came home from the trip and couldn't wait to tell my mom and dad about my day. That evening at dinner, I told them about the field trip and my desire to pursue a career as an Air Force fighter pilot. I could see the changes of emotions on their faces. All my wound-up energy and enthusiasm from the day deflated faster than a popped balloon. They were not thrilled like I hoped they would be. Instead, they

started an extended explanation of the dangers of a career like this. They did not approve of this and made it vehemently clear that it was their expectation that I choose a career that they too felt was appropriate. I knew that they were the voice of reason and common sense, but as a young teenager, this crushed me. I didn't want to disappoint them and so I began hanging up the dream of becoming a fighter pilot. Over the years, I would attend air shows and flight museums and be reminded of the dream I once had as a kid. Fast forward 32 years – I had the opportunity to build a World War II fighter plane model, the legendary P-51D Mustang, with my son. In a way, I felt that I was living out the dream through the experience.

We had a vacation to Florida coming up in December of 2022, and while researching things to do, I came across a corporation that offered the opportunity to fly the legendary P-51D, and no prior experience was required! The stars must've been in alignment that day as I felt like my younger self with the same dream. I found myself again at the dinner table, this time with my wife and kids. After I shared the idea, I could see the speechless look on my wife's face. The air was filled with the silence of genuine concern and disapproval. Even the crickets took the night off! It felt like déjà vu. This was not just a mid-life crisis, but a childhood dream. My persistence paid off, and I was finally able to make this dream a reality.

I arrived at the facility bright and early with my family. After a 2-hour flight briefing and training session, we headed to the tarmac to go over the aircraft. I climbed into the cockpit to perform preflight checks. Moments later the bubble canopy was closed, and we took off. I was in the air for an hour and performed several aerobatic routines while piloting this war bird myself. Some routines were more complex than others. Some of them exerted G-forces that pushed my physical abilities and helped me gain a profound respect for those young WWII pilots. After I landed, I reviewed the flight footage and did a debrief. I caught up with my family with an earto-ear grin.



I never thought I'd be able to accomplish this during my lifetime. I really thought I had "aged out" of being able to fulfill this dream. I wanted this to be a teaching

moment for my kids to let them know that accomplishing your dreams may mean that you will have to navigate temporary roadblocks and setbacks. Regardless of how long it takes, if you work hard and are motivated and determined, dreams do come true.

Terren, thank you for your suggestions.


